ABOUT BOTANY BAY YACHT CLUB

We are a not-for-profit sailing club affiliated with Australian Sailing. We race and cruise yachts on the enclosed, pristine and uncrowded waters of Botany Bay, Kogarah Bay and the Georges River. Our club is run by member volunteers for the benefit of all members. We pitch in to create a great family-friendly environment with a relaxed social atmosphere.

Clubhouse

The Club is open on race days, meeting nights and at other times for Club activities. The forward schedule of our sailing activities is listed in our Schedule of Events (p68).

Galley and bar

Hot food and refreshments are available on race days. The Club bar also operates on race days and may be open at other times to suit cruising and other Club activities.

Amenities

Hot showers and toilets are situated on the ground level underneath the clubhouse and are strictly limited to use by Club members and hardstand customers.

Parking

Parking within the Club's property is reserved for Full members only and spaces are limited. Priority is given to boat-owning members participating in scheduled Club events.

Access to the club and amenities is limited via coded security. We value our neighbours and appreciate your consideration for minimising noise when arriving and leaving the Club. Please do NOT park on the centre island of Endeavour Street.

Boatyard and Hardstand

The Club's boatyard and dock area are operated by our commercial tenant, Endeavour Boatshed (EBS). Slipping and hardstand facilities are available by arrangement with EBS. Crane use is restricted to members trained in its operation by EBS. The #1 slipway can accommodate vessels up to 18T. Owners' tenders may be stored on the hardstand rack for a fee by arrangement with EBS. BBYC Full members will save 10% on antifouling pricing. EBS will explain any restrictions that apply to activities within the boatyard and dock areas during business hours. Fees apply for all services. Please contact EBS for more information:

Tender

The Club provides a tender on weekends and public holidays for transport to and from vessels listed on the Club's register and moored in Kogarah Bay. Priority use is given to those sailing in Club events, with use of the tender before and after events reserved for those racing on Friday and Saturday and sailing in Sunday cruise events. Please refer to the Tender Use Policy for more detailed information regarding operation of the tender.

BBYC also provides a dinghy, which is available for use by members at any time. Both the tender and the dinghy are for transport to and from a member's vessel with fast turnaround required. Neither may be left tied to a vessel or a mooring. On race days, to enable everyone to be picked up quickly, skippers are requested to pick up and set down crew and equipment at either the Club pontoon or the public wharf, so that only 2 people are transported to or from a mooring. An exception may be made for deep-drafted boats.

Dock

The main pontoon dock is available for Full member boat owners to use on weekends and public holidays. Priority is given to boats sailing in Club events, including races, regattas and cruising activities.

Vessels may not be left unattended at the dock or overnight without the prior permission of the Club's Rear Commodore or Commodore.

On weekdays, Full member boat owners may contact EBS to arrange use of the dock, subject to at least three days' notice and not disrupting EBS activities. No fee applies for Club members.

Swing moorings

EBS manages 28 swing moorings on behalf of the Club, which are available for both short- and long-term rental arrangements. Please contact EBS if you would like to rent a swing mooring.

SUMMARY OF THE 2024-25 RACING SEASON

The 2024-25 season was another enjoyable and well-managed schedule of races in and around Botany Bay. The season comprised a great mix of Olympic-style Bay races, windward-leeward sprint races, transit (handicap start passage) races starting and finishing off the clubhouse, and non-spinnaker twilight races, providing something for everyone in our mixed fleet of keelboats and sports boats. Six races needed to be abandoned during the regular season due to hazardous weather conditions or lack of wind – two bay races, one transit series and three twilights. The club's annual Presentation Day was very well attended and enjoyed.

Racing was closely contested with high participation. Well done to the placegetters for all Series and special trophy races. *Frenzy* started the Spring Series with conscious intent and won it from *Resurgent* and *Wundurra*. *Griffin* snared the Summer series from *Resurgent* and *Wundurra*, while *Frenzy* took the Autumn series from *Wundurra* and *Stockade*. The Club Championship was a shoe in for *Frenzy* in a blazing season, with *Resurgent* getting into second from *Wundurra*. It was great to see *Wundurra* put in such a wonderful season with Chris and Charles backing up the Ace. They were pipped for the Endeavour Scratch Series by *Tic Tacs*.

The Transit Series was well won by *Frenzy* from *Wundurra* and *Resurgent*. The Sprint Series was won by *Resurgent* from *Griffin* and *Tic Tacs*. Three boats finished equal on points for the 2025 Winter Series, with a countback separating placegetters – *Tic Tacs* won from *Wundurra* and *Griffin*.

Again, great thanks to our fantastic starters for their wonderful efforts which are much appreciated.

The twilight fleet numbers were again strong for both series. *Dragon Lady* won the Spring Twilight Series from *Scallywag Too* and *Tic Tacs*. The latter backed up to win the New Year Twilight Series from *Dragon Lady* and *Stingray*. For the twilight extender race *Stingray* got the gong in a most deserved result – Hermann and his crew doing a heap of work and improvements to the boat. For the full twilight season, it was *Dragon Lady* in a great breakthrough by Nick and his crew, from *Tics Tacs* and *Scallywag Too*.

The table below (p12) summarises the Series and Special Trophy handicap placegetters through the season – congratulations to all participants for the spirited competition. The Endeavour Series is based on scratch results. Of course, the monthly Log is posted on the BBYC Facebook page with detailed records of all racing, cruising, and up-coming events.

BBYC RISK WARNING

This RISK WARNING is issued jointly by the Botany Bay Yacht Club (BBYC) and Transport for NSW (TfNSW), pursuant to the Civil Liability Act 2002, to all persons wishing to participate in sailing activities conducted by the Botany Bay Yacht Club.

Participants are warned that, regardless of the precautions which might be taken by reasonable and experienced persons, sailing can be a dangerous pursuit and participants are exposed to significant risk of property damage, physical harm and possible injury or death.

As an indication, these risks include, but are not limited to:

- The extremes of weather and sea conditions;
- The potential that control of vessels may be lost, resulting in collision with objects and other vessels;
- The sudden movement of the vessel at any time and the possibility that participants may fall or be thrown overboard, resulting in injury or drowning;
- The possibility that participants may be injured by equipment on the vessel;
- The absence of immediate medical care and the likelihood that significant delay may occur before medical care is available;
- Exposure to the elements for extended periods.

BBYC and TfNSW warn participants that, regardless of their best intentions, they may be unable to render assistance to participants who are in distress. Participants are warned to consider the above risks and all other risks before deciding to participate in any BBYC sailing event.

Participants are also advised that, although BBYC is covered by third party liability insurance, this cover does not extend to participants. It is mandatory that all boats participating in BBYC events are covered by appropriate and adequate insurance, with third party liability protection of not less than \$10,000,000. BBYC is affiliated with Australian Sailing, so club members participating in BBYC events receive limited personal accident insurance cover. Any participant who considers they need additional personal insurance should make their own arrangements with an insurer.

IMPORTANT NOTE FOR SKIPPERS

To protect the club and our sailors, it is the responsibility of individual skippers to ensure that all crew are financial members or have obtained a SailPass before participating in any BBYC event on their boat. This is available from bbyc.com.au. Please conduct a safety briefing for new crew.

Any non-member who has participated in twelve BBYC events via SailPass must apply for BBYC membership before participating in further club events. Once a non-member has participated in twelve BBYC events, skippers must alert a BBYC Flag Officer or a Director. Please contact the Secretary if you have any queries.

Weather Warning Safe Sailing Policy

This policy relates to the cancellation or abandonment of **Botany Bay Yacht Club** (“Club”) sailing events, including racing and cruising events, which may be due to inclement weather and / or unsafe sailing conditions. Attention is also drawn to the BBYC Heat Stress Risk Policy, outlined elsewhere in this Document.

The purpose of both the Safe Sailing and the Heat Stress Risk policies is to guide Club Officers, and Members, in helping to ensure racing and other sailing events are conducted with due regard to the safety of Club members, boats and members of the public with whom we share our local waterways.

The policies do not infer any liability on the Club, its Board of Directors, Race Committee, Race Starters or any agent of the Club for any damage or injury sustained while racing or cruising in an event organised by the Club or its agents. All Skippers and other participants are advised to consider the various risk warnings issued by the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM), Transport for NSW (NSW Maritime) and the Club prior to participating in any sailing event conducted by the Club.

Useful weather warning information

Weather warnings are issued by the BOM and are specific to areas of each State (e.g. Sydney coastal waters, Sydney closed waters, etc.). Considerations by Skippers in relation to such warnings include:

- **When will the wind warning conditions start?**

Skippers must assess whether they have enough time to get back to port before the wind reaches warning strength or take all reasonable safety precautions, including but not limited to reducing sail area, ensuring all those aboard are wearing appropriate life jackets, seeking shelter, etc.

- **What speed will the wind reach?**

Refer to the BOM wind warning ranges (table overleaf). Skippers must be aware of what wind conditions their vessel can handle safely and take steps to avoid unnecessary risk.

Strong Wind	Winds averaging from 26 knots up to 33 knots
Gale	Winds averaging from 34 knots up to 47 knots
Storm Force Wind	Winds averaging from 48 knots up to 63 knots
Hurricane Force Wind	Winds averaging from 64 knots or more

NOTE - Average wind strength (for a 10 minute period) can include wind gusts of 40% or more above the forecast or observed average. Refer *Diagram 1* to see a typical wind chart.

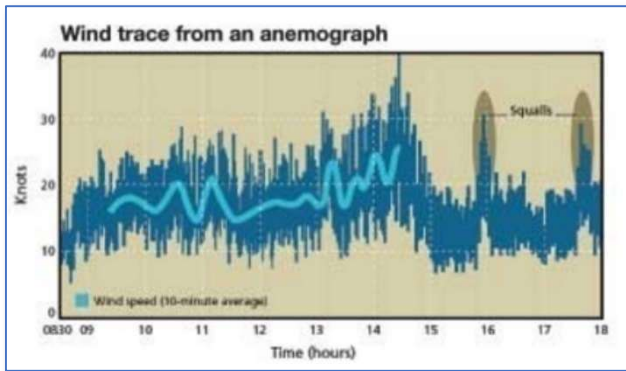

BOM website data for NSW (www.bom.gov.au/nsw/observations/sydney.shtml) updates every 10 minutes and gives recorded average and gust wind speeds over that 10 minute period. The highest wind gust since midnight of that day is also indicated. See *Table 1* example.

Other safety considerations

- Known hazards may also be present that require consideration and may lead to a sailing event cancellation or abandonment.
- Thunderstorms, lightning, hail and other environmental issues may also affect the race course area during the time of the race or sailing event.
- Other factors such as pollution from current or recent floods (debris and large floating material), oil spills or known sunken / submerged objects may also represent safety risks.

Race postponement or abandonment

When a **gale or stronger warning** has been issued by the BOM, which is current for the area of the race within 2 hours of the scheduled start, that race shall be postponed, or abandoned with no further racing on the day.

When a **strong wind warning** has been issued and is current for the area of the race within 2 hours of the scheduled start, the Race Committee has the discretion to vary the start time by up to one hour, postpone or abandon that race.

Where no local wind warnings are in force, but the BOM forecast or recorded data from local BOM weather stations (e.g. Sydney Airport or Kurnell) indicate the occurrence or likelihood of **wind gusts of 26 knots or above for a significant period**, the Race Committee has the discretion to vary the start time by up to one hour, postpone or abandon that race. For forecast or actual **wind gusts of 30kts or above for a significant period**, it is recommended that the race be abandoned.

Where a race has been varied, postponed or abandoned by the Race Committee, all endeavours will be made to post the decision on the Club's [Facebook Page](#) and <https://www.bbyc.com.au> website Home page. Skippers may also be alerted via SMS or SIGNAL group app. **The Race Starter has similar discretion** when boats are already on the water. Please refer to 'International Sailing Flags and Pennants' (pg 65) for signals that will apply for delayed starts or abandoned races.

Heat Stress Risk Policy

This policy relates to the cancellation or abandonment of BBYC sailing events when elevated heat stress risk conditions are forecast. The purpose of this policy is to inform Club Officers, as well as members, in decision-making with respect to sailing during hot weather, including in organised BBYC events.

This policy does not infer any liability on the Club, its Board of Directors, Race Committee, Race Starters or any agent of the Club for any injury sustained while racing or cruising in an event organised by the Club or its agents. All skippers and other participants are advised to consider the heat stress risks before participating in any sailing event conducted by the Club.

The BBYC policy is based on the Extreme Heat Policy issued by Sports Medicine Australia (SMA; v1.0, issued February 2021). The full policy document, and additional information on heat-related hazards, is available at <https://sma.org.au/resources/policies-and-guidelines/>.

Heat illness is characterised by nausea, dizziness, vomiting and fainting, and can result in death. The heat stress risk assessment published by SMA models the effect of both temperature and humidity, adjusted for solar radiation and wind.

BBYC members should note that reading or using these guidelines, or the full SMA policy, is not the same as getting medical advice from your doctor or health professional.

How to predict heat stress risk during sailing

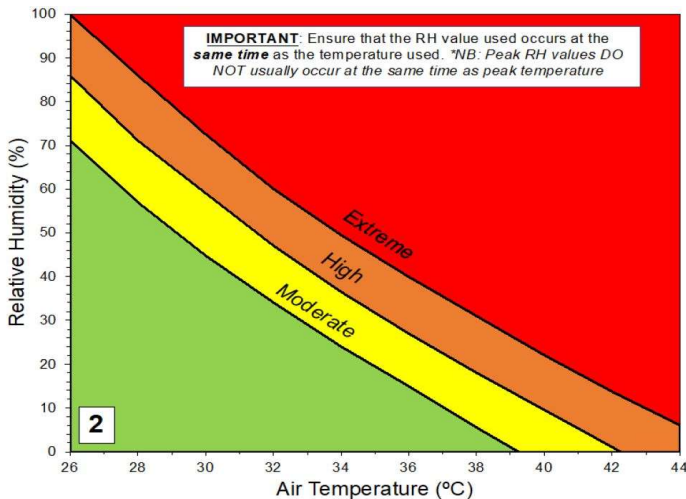


Figure 2. Heat Stress Risk for sailing. **GREEN** = Low Risk, **YELLOW** = Moderate Risk; **ORANGE** = High Risk; **RED** = Extreme Risk. Figure courtesy Sports Medicine Australia Extreme Heat Policy.

Under the SMA policy, sports in Australia have been split into 5 “risk classification” groups, 1 being the lowest and 5 the highest risk group. Sailing is in risk group 2. Heat stress risk while sailing can be determined by inputting predicted temperature and relative humidity (RH) into the SMA Heat Stress graph for sport risk group 2 (Figure 2 below).

To find the forecast temperature and RH for where and when you will be sailing, go to the Australian Bureau of Meteorology website. The detailed 3-hourly forecast for Botany Bay can be found at:

<http://www.bom.gov.au/places/nsw/botany-bay/forecast/detailed/> (Figure 1).

Click on “Detailed 3-Hourly Forecast”, select the appropriate date then, in the column for the time of day that you will be sailing, note the “Air Temperature (°C)” value and, further down in the same column, note the concurrent “Relative Humidity (%)” value.

Botany Bay Detailed Forecast (beta)

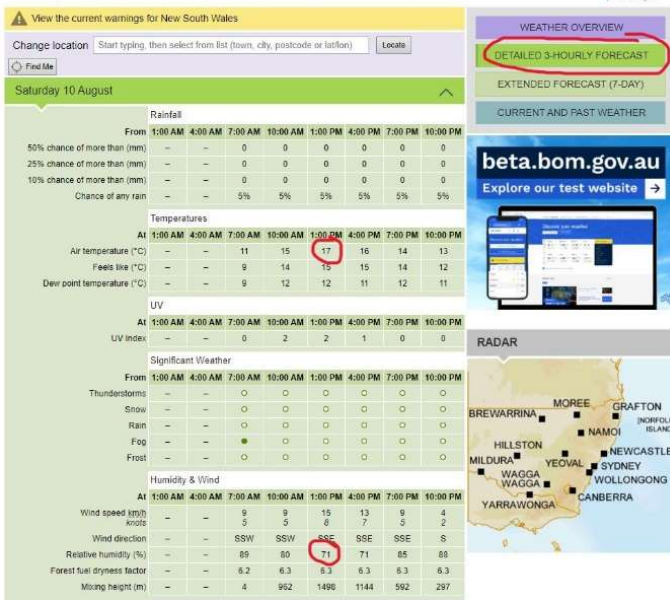

On the graph of Heat Stress Risk (Figure 2) read across from the forecast RH to meet the line up from the forecast temperature – the colour zone at this point of intersection predicts the heat stress risk. For example, the forecast described above, for RH of 69% and temperature of 27°C, would just fall

into the moderate risk for heat stress illness during sailing.

Increased susceptibility to heat stress

While even the fittest athlete can fall victim to heat-related illness, certain people are especially vulnerable:

- Aged over 65 years, especially if unfit. Note that thermoregulation may become progressively worse with age, so risk is generally greater with more advanced age;
- Heart or kidney conditions present a greater risk of cardiovascular or renal failure during or following exercise in the heat;
- Recently sick with a fever;
- Taking prescription medications that impair sweating;
- A reduced ability to behaviourally respond to heat, e.g. due to mental health challenges or substance abuse;
- Very high body fat;
- Recently (in the past week) arrived from a cold climate.

Mitigating heat stress risk while sailing

Plan ahead to sail safely in the heat. The recommendations below from SMA can reduce the risk of heat stress.

Low risk (green zone):

- Hydrate and wear appropriate clothing
- Ensure pre-exercise hydration by consuming 6 ml of water per kilogram of body weight every 2-3 hours before exercise. For a 70kg individual, this equates to 420ml of fluid every 2-3 hours (a standard sports drink bottle contains 500ml).
- Drink regularly throughout exercise. You should aim to drink enough to offset sweat losses, but it is important to avoid over-drinking because this can also have negative health effects.
- Where possible, select light-weight and breathable clothing with extra ventilation.
- Remove unnecessary clothing/equipment and/or excess clothing layers.
- Reduce the amount of skin that is covered by clothing - this will help increase your sweat evaporation, which will help you dissipate heat*.

*NOTE: Sunscreen does NOT impede sweating or affect heat loss from the skin. Sunscreen should be applied regularly, as per instructions, to avoid sunburn.

Moderate risk (yellow zone): Follow the low-risk recommendations. In addition, for scheduled yacht races that coincide with moderate risk periods, the Race Committee may decide to shorten the course/race duration to minimise the exposure of participants.

Note that while hats provide UV protection, they provide minimal protection against the heat.

High risk (orange zone): Follow the low and moderate risk recommendations. In addition, the actions listed here may reduce the incidence of heat stress:

- Drinking cold fluids and/or ice slushies before sailing. Note that cold water and ice slushy ingestion during exercise is less effective for cooling.
- Submersing your arms/feet in cold water.
- Water dousing - wetting your skin with cool water using a sponge or a spray bottle helps increase evaporation, which is the most effective cooling mechanism in the heat.
- Placing an ice pack or damp towel filled with crushed ice around your neck.

Extreme risk (red zone): The SMA Policy recommends that all sporting activities should be suspended, and active cooling strategies adopted.

As a recent example, the BBYC race held on Saturday 28 Nov 2020 coincided with a recorded temperature of 41°C and RH of 13%. These readings are in the High risk zone for heat stress risk. Some BBYC crew were impacted during that race.

Race cancellation or abandonment

BBYC events will not proceed when the combination of temperature and RH are forecast to reach the Extreme zone on the above chart. Further, the BBYC Race Committee has the discretion to abandon scheduled races when the combination of temperature and RH are forecast to reach the high zone on the above chart.

Signs and management of heat stress

During periods of elevated heat stress risk, ensure all crew members are observed closely for signs of stress. If any crew are affected, it is strongly recommended that the boat turns back to the club immediately. Advise the starter boat by VHF radio and, if the person is fainting or otherwise requires medical assistance, call an ambulance on 000. In the meantime, assess and treat the affected crew as per Table 1 below.

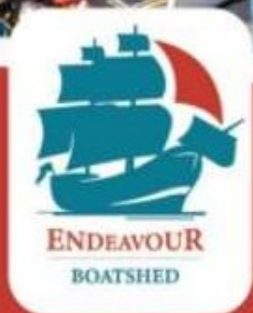

CONDITIONS OF SAILING

1. Rules

Racing will be governed by the current Part B - Steering and Sailing Rules of The International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, Australian Sailing Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-24 (RRS) and Australian Sailing Special Regulations (ASSR), the Boating (Safety Equipment) Regulations of NSW and these Conditions of Sailing as amended by the Sailing Instructions (SI).

2. Race Committee

The Race Committee of Botany Bay Yacht Club is comprised of the following positions:

- Commodore
- Rear Commodore
- Honorary Race Secretary
- A Starter

3. Responsibility

- 3.1 All those taking part in events do so at their own risk.
- 3.2 BBYC, the Race Committee and sponsors are not responsible for the seaworthiness of a yacht whose entry is accepted or for the sufficiency or adequacy of its equipment.
- 3.3 BBYC, the Race Committee and sponsors are not responsible for any damage or injury that occurs, either ashore or afloat, to persons or property which might result from participation in races. It is mandatory that boats have adequate insurance cover.
- 3.4 Attention is drawn to RRS Part 1, Rules 1, 2, 3 and 4.
- 3.5 The attention of Skippers and crews is drawn to ASSR Advisory Appendix D “Man Overboard – Quick Stop and the Life Sling”
<https://cdn.revolutionise.com.au/site/uoa1gvknbxk0adjq.pdf>.
- 3.6 In the event of a man overboard incident when proceeding to, during or following a race, Competitors **MUST** immediately notify the Committee Vessel (**CV**) by VHF radio (Channel 77 or 16).
- 3.7 Competitors **MUST** immediately notify the **CV** (or the Club when **CV** not used) by VHF radio (Channel 77) in case of their retirement from any race.

4. Definition of Races

- 4.1 **OCEAN RACE:** Races in which yachts proceed to sea. A boat is deemed to be “at sea” when it is to seaward of the transit line of Cape Solander and Cape Banks.
- 4.2 **BAY RACES:** Races which are conducted totally within Botany Bay using inflatable buoys or fixed, yellow RMS special buoys as marks.
- 4.3 **TRANSIT RACES:** Races which are conducted totally within Botany Bay, Georges River and/or Kogarah Bay.
- 4.4 **SPRINT RACES:** Races which are usually conducted within Botany Bay using short windward-leeward courses using inflatable buoys or fixed, yellow RMS special buoys as marks.
- 4.5 **TWILIGHT/SUNDAY RACES:** Non-spinnaker races, which are conducted totally within Botany Bay, Georges River and/or Kogarah Bay using mostly fixed, yellow RMS special marks.

5. Eligibility

- 5.1 All races are open to single hulled fixed keel or trailable yachts that comply with AS Special Regulations Part 1, as amended by BBYC.
- 5.2 Yachts must be on the register of a recognised yacht club.
- 5.3 The Race Committee shall be the sole arbiter of compliance with eligibility requirements.

6. Racing

- 6.1 To be eligible to compete in a point score series, a yacht must remain under the same ownership and be entered for the entire series. Change of ownership requires a new entry to be lodged by the new owner for any point score series or race.
- 6.2 All yachts competing in a one-class division or a one-class point score series must abide by the rules and measurements of the Class Association.

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7. Entry

- 7.1 Eligible yachts may enter by completing the requisite BBYC race entry form and informing the Race Committee of their intention to race prior to the scheduled start time.
- 7.2 For a yacht to be entered in a point score series, the owner of that yacht must be a current and financial Full Member of BBYC.
- 7.3 Crew must be current BBYC members (Full, Crew or Junior) or hold a valid SailPass.
- 7.4 Entries must be accompanied by payment of the prescribed race or point score series entry fee. Entries will not be accepted unless accompanied by the requisite entry fee.
- 7.5 Entries must be accompanied by a copy of a current Equipment Audit form applicable to the series or race/s entered.
- 7.6 Entries must be supported by appropriate insurance details.
- 7.7 Casual entries are permissible and are subject to a single race entry fee.
- 7.8 Casual entrants are not point score series entrants.
- 7.9 Pursuant to 7.2, 7.3, 7.4, 7.5 and 7.6, any series race completed by a boat where, prior to that series race, the relevant fee has not been paid, the yacht owner is not a current Full Member, the crew are not all current BBYC members or Sail Pass holders, a current Equipment Audit form has not been provided, or current and appropriate insurance details have not been provided, will be recorded as 'Did Not Compete' (DNC).

8. Equipment Compliance

- 8.1 All yachts shall comply with AS Special Regulations Part 1. Yacht owners shall have obtained and possess a current Equipment Compliance Form signed by a BBYC accredited Equipment Auditor as appropriate for the category of race.

8.2 Event Categories

- 8.2.1 AS Category 7 equivalent plus navigation lights, life buoy and sound signal for all races conducted in Kogarah Bay, Botany Bay or Georges River.
- 8.2.2 AS Category 4 equivalent for all offshore races.

8.3 Equipment Compliance Inspections

8.3.1 Inspections can be arranged by appointment.

8.3.2 The Race Committee reserves the right to conduct additional inspections at any time. Yachts failing to comply with the BBYC Equipment Audit (guided by AS Special Regulations Part 1) may be disqualified.

8.3.3 Owners are expected to make all equipment readily available for inspection and be able to demonstrate equipment use as required by the Equipment Auditor.

8.3.4 Attention is drawn to AS Special Regulations Rule 1.02 “Owners Responsibility”.

8.4 Additional Equipment Compliance Requirements

8.4.1 A life ring or horseshoe must be carried on deck ready for immediate deployment (RRS 1.2).

8.4.2 A VHF radio capable of monitoring and communicating on channels 16 and 77 must be carried on board.

9. Point Scores

Point scores are calculated on handicap places unless otherwise specified. Point scores series will be conducted for:

9.1 Saturday Bay Races

A series of races held on Bay courses.

9.1.1 Spring Series (September to November)

9.1.2 Summer Series (Nov/Dec to February)

9.1.3 Autumn Series (Feb/Mar to April)

9.1.4 Championship Series (A combination of the Spring to Autumn series)

9.1.5 Winter Series (June to July)

9.2 Endeavour Championship

Series for Endeavour class yachts based on yardstick placing in the Championship Series.

9.3 Transit Series

Series of Transit races using fixed, special RMS yellow buoys or orange inflatable buoys.

9.4 Sprint Series

Series of Windward / Leeward races held on course 'W'.

9.5 Twilight Series

Series of races mostly held on Kogarah Bay and Georges River during Daylight Saving on Friday evenings.

9.6 Short Course Series

Series of shorter course races for cruising boats held pursuant to sub-section 9.1, typically with a separate start time to the main racing fleet.

9.7 Short Off-Shore Series

Series of races proceeding to sea as an Ocean Race, starting and finishing in Botany Bay

9.8 Short Transit Series

Series of Transit races conducted on the same day as the above Short Offshore Series

9.9 All-rounders Series

Series comprising a combination of Bay, Transit and Sprint races.

9.10 Other point scores may be conducted at the discretion of the Race Committee and/or Board.

10. Schedule

10.1 Dates of events and races are listed in the Schedule of Events. Other events and races may be conducted at the discretion of the Race Committee and/or Board.

11. Scoring

11.1 The Low Point Scoring System (RRS, Appendix A; clause A4) shall apply, inclusive of these amendments.

11.2 Boats which start and then retire or otherwise are not recorded as finishers, shall be awarded points for the finishing place one more than the number of boats that started the race.

11.3 Discards – Any Series

11.3.1 Where four (4) races or less are sailed in a series, all races are to count to the point score.

11.3.2 Where five (5) or six (6) races are sailed in a series, a yacht is permitted to drop one (1) race in that point score.

11.3.3 Where seven (7), eight (8), nine (9) or ten (10) races are sailed in a series, a yacht is permitted to drop two (2) races in that point score.

11.3.4 Where eleven (11) to fourteen (14) races are sailed in a series, a yacht is permitted to drop three (3) races in that point score series.

11.3.5 Where fifteen (15) to twenty (20) races are sailed in a series, a yacht is permitted to drop four (4) races in that point score series.

11.3.6 Where more than twenty (20) races are sailed in a series, a yacht is permitted to drop five (5) races in that point score series.

11.4 Boats competing in State, National, World Championships & other recognised interclub events and also entered in a point score series, shall be eligible to receive points for the races missed equal to the boat's average points for that point score series. Average points will be based on all races in the series (including discards) except the race(s) in question.

11.5 Any yacht required to supply a starter, a starter's assistant, or an attendee at an Australian Sailing Conference, and is therefore unable to compete in the race, shall be eligible to receive average points for that race as per clause 11.4.

12. Sailing Instructions

12.1 Sailing Instructions are detailed in this BBYC Handbook.

12.2 Supplementary Sailing Instructions will be issued for offshore races and may be issued for special events and will be posted on the Club Notice Board.

12.3 Supplementary Sailing Instructions will be issued for all Transit races on the morning of the event and posted on the Club Notice Board.

13. Courses

13.1 Courses will be detailed in the Sailing Instructions.

14. Alterations to Conditions of Sailing, Program & Sailing Instructions

14.1 The Race Committee reserves the right to alter these Conditions of Sailing, the Program and Sailing Instructions.

14.2 These changes will be made available in writing.

14.3 Changes will be posted on the Club Notice Board not later than 12:00 (noon) on the day of racing.

15. Handicaps

15.1 Arbitrary Handicap races will be decided through the application of a Time Correction Factor (TCF) as a multiplier of the yacht's elapsed time. The Race Committee will at its sole discretion determine and adjust a yacht's TCF based on its previous performance.

15.2 Any alteration to a yacht affecting its performance (including but not limited to changes in sail area, ballast, displacement, propeller dimension or configuration, keel or rudder shape or hull shape) must be notified to the RC in writing. Failure to do so may be grounds for disqualification. Owners are encouraged to seek clarification as required from the Rear Commodore or Honorary Race Secretary.

15.3 The Race Committee may require a yacht to complete 3 races before allocating a handicap.

15.4 A change of ownership or helmsperson of a yacht may result in an adjustment to the TCF for that yacht.

16. Trophies

Trophies shall be presented at the discretion of the Race Committee and/or the BBYC Board.



2025-26 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

1. Rules

Racing shall be governed by the current Part B - Steering and Sailing Rules of The International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, the Australian Sailing Racing Rules of Sailing 2025-28 (RRS) and AS Special Regulations (ASSR; July 2024), the Boating (Safety Equipment) Regulations of NSW and the BBYC Conditions of Sailing as amended by these Sailing Instructions (SI) and/or SI issued for specific races or events.

2. Responsibility

- 2.1 All those taking part do so at their own risk. Competitor's attention is drawn to the Risk Warning published elsewhere in this Handbook.
- 2.2 Attention is drawn to Rules 1, 2, 3 and 4 in RRS Part 1 and ASSR 1.02.

3. Flags, Pennants and Burgees

- 3.1 Flags and pennants are those of the International Code of Signals.
- 3.2 The Race Committee burgee is the BBYC burgee.

4. Schedule of Races

- 4.1 Races are scheduled as per the Schedule of Events published as part of this Document.

5. Ranking as a Starter

- 5.1 Yacht skippers shall sign on in the Clubhouse prior to the first race of the day and provide the yacht's Sail Number and the name of every person on board. Where a Start Boat is present, yachts shall also report crew numbers to the starter before each race.
- 5.2 A yacht shall receive acknowledgement of her report from the starter.
- 5.3 Yachts shall fly the BBYC Burgee.
- 5.4 Yachts that arrive in the starting area more than 10 minutes after the start signal for their class or division may result in the boat not being ranked as a starter.

5.5 Yachts participating in Twilight and Pursuit races must, from **BEFORE** their starting signal until **AFTER** they finish, activate RaceQs on an onboard smartphone.

6. One Boat Constitutes a Race

6.1 Should one (1) boat in any class or division appear at the start then that boat shall be entitled to sail the course.

7. Crew Limitations

7.1 The minimum number of crew for any Twilight or Bay race will be **two (2)**. They may be an adult and a junior with a minimum age of **fourteen (14) years** and appropriate sailing experience.

7.2 The minimum number of crew for any Ocean race will be **three (3)** with a minimum age of **eighteen (18) years**.

8. Racing Area

8.1 **All courses are subject to Waterside Restricted zones at Maritime Security Level 1, which will vary at increased security levels. Each of these zones is a Continuous Obstruction.**

8.1.1 All vessels are prohibited within **80 metres** of the runways of Sydney Airport and the area between them as designated by special yellow buoys.

8.1.2 The water between Port Botany and Molineaux Point, enclosing all of the Brotherson Dock area, is a **prohibited** sailing area.

8.1.3 The water around the Tanker Mooring buoys and the Refinery Jetty at Kurnell is a **prohibited** sailing area.

8.2 No racing, from 5 minutes before a yacht's starting signal, is allowed inside the **outer line** of moored boats within Kogarah Bay, including the channel from the BBYC pontoon.

8.3 For courses published in these Sailing Instructions that require a transit or partial transit of the Georges River:

8.3.1 Yachts must use the river main channel (as indicated by Transport NSW channel marks) for that section of the course.

8.3.2 No racing is allowed inside the outer line of moored boats in Kogarah Bay or Georges River;

8.3.3 If the course enters or exits the river, yachts must pass between Inner Towra Pile (**ITP**) starboard mark and Outer Towra Pile (**OTP**)

port mark when entering or exiting the river. They shall leave **OTP** to starboard when leaving and to port when entering the channel.

8.3.4 If Captain Cook Bridge forms part of the course, yachts must pass through one of the three central spans of the bridge.

8.3.5 If the course involves Kogarah Bay, yachts must enter and exit the bay between the starboard mark at St George Motor Boat Club and the yellow RMS Special Mark at the entrance to Kogarah Bay.

8.4 For all courses starting and finishing in Botany Bay (Bay Races), both **OTP** and **ITP** are to be passed on their correct side.

9. Sailing to and from the Race Area

9.1 Please show courtesy to any fleets racing in the Georges River and **do not** sail across their start or finish lines.

9.2 Avoid crossing the fixed finish line between the St. George Sailing Club and a buoy across the un-marked inner channel (along the Sans Souci shoreline).

10. Courses

10.1 Marks (see map centre pages)

10.1.1 Kogarah Bay

CW BBYC inflatable mark placed directly west of BBYC club.

TP Taren Point Mark (Yellow RMS mark ~ 200m W of Capt. Cook Bridge)

TUM Tom Uglys Mark (Yellow RMS buoy ~ 300m East of Tom Uglys Bridge)

10.1.2 Woolooware Bay

WBP Woolooware Bay Police blue mark (entrance to Woolooware Bay). Where more than one blue Police mark is present, yachts must round the largest of those marks.

10.1.3 Botany Bay

CV **Committee Vessel**

S A mark near the Committee Vessel (CV) forming a start line. This may be a BBYC orange or yellow inflatable mark or a fixed yellow mark.



Mark Descriptions

- 1 A fixed yellow RMS Yacht Rounding Mark (YRM) laid off southern Lady Robinson Beach near Ramsgate.
- 2 A fixed yellow RMS YRM off northern Lady Robinson Beach near Brighton.
- 3 A fixed yellow RMS YRM laid off the Airport runways.
- 4 A fixed yellow RMS YRM laid off Silver Beach, Kurnell.
- 5 A fixed yellow RMS YRM laid near the entrance to Quibray Bay.
- 6 A yellow or orange inflatable mark laid where required.
- 7 A yellow or orange inflatable mark laid where required.



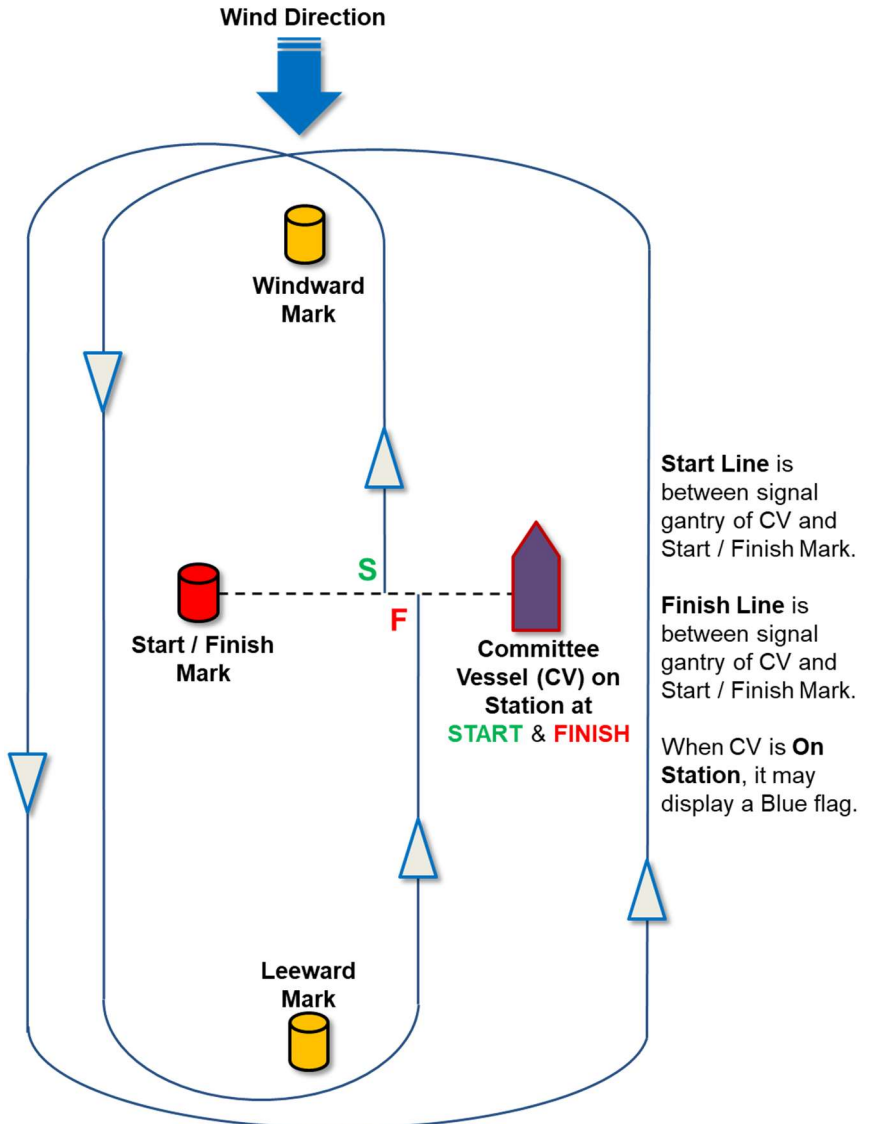
10.2 Botany Bay Courses

10.2.1 The following Diagrams show the course configurations for Windward / Leeward and Olympic triangle courses. The approximate length of the windward legs will be between 1 and 1.8 nautical miles. **Port-hand courses** are depicted here, with **starboard hand courses** (except the start and finish lines) being mirror reversed. The CV will usually remain at the starboard end of the line regardless of rounding direction.

Course W – Windward/Leeward

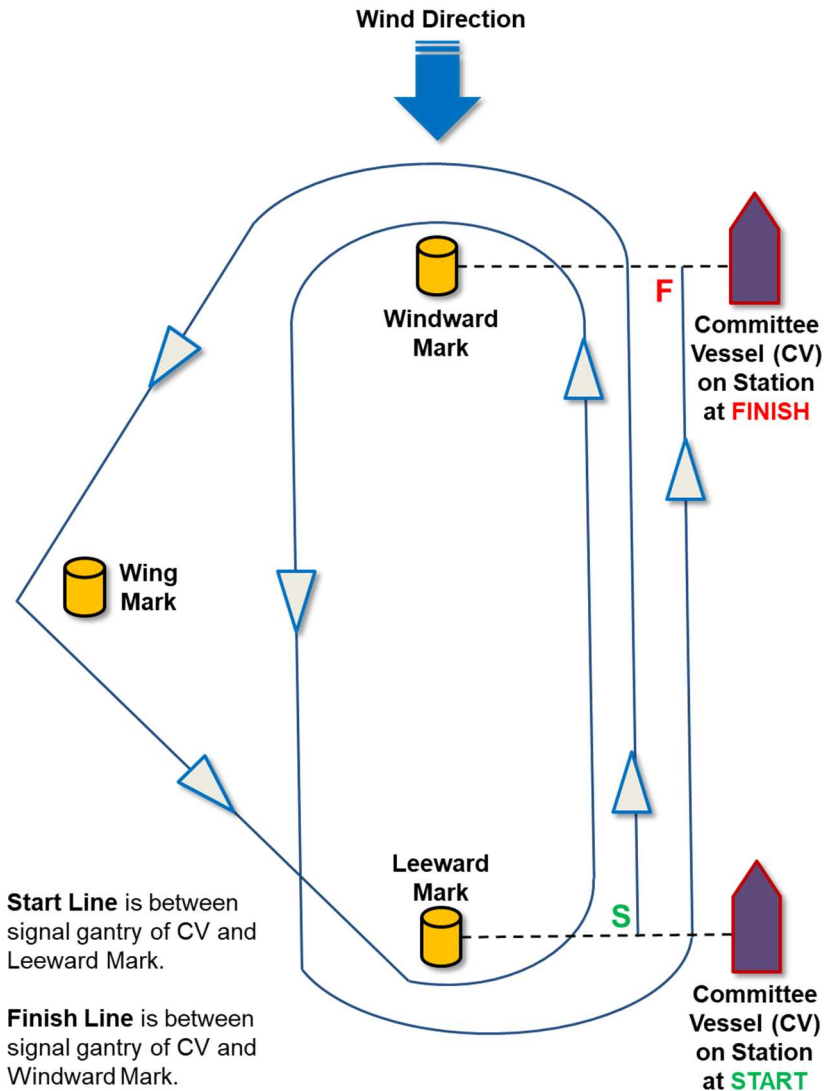
Start - Windward - Leeward - Windward - Leeward - Finish

Note: Yachts may leave the Start / Finish line to **port** or **starboard**, so as **NOT TO PASS** through the gate created between the Start / Finish Mark and the Committee Vessel (CV) on any leg of the course, except for the start and finish legs.



Course O – Olympic

Start - Windward - Wing - Leeward - Windward - Leeward - Finish



When CV is **On Station**, it may display a Blue flag.

10.2.2 The course to be sailed will be designated by displaying Code Flag “O” or “W” over a Red or Green flag. Where a Red flag is displayed, all marks shall be left to port. Where a Green flag is displayed, all marks shall be left to starboard.

10.2.3 The Windward mark may be substituted with a RMS Yellow fixed mark and this substitution will be notified from the Committee vessel.

10.3 Kogarah Bay Courses

The course to be sailed shall be signalled with a Code Flag from the mast of the CV signal gantry or the BBYC Club Mast.

In the list below, (p) = port rounding and (s) = starboard rounding.

Course F: Start – WPB (s) – TUM (s) – CW (s) – TP (s) Finish

Course G: Start – WPB (s) – TUM (s) – Finish

Course H: Start – 1 (Ramsgate) (s) – Finish

Course J: Start – TUM (p) – TP (p) – TUM (p) – TP (p) – Finish

Course K: Start – TP (s) – TUM (s) – TP (s) – TUM (s) – Finish

Course R: Start – 1 (Ramsgate) (s) – WBP (s) – TUM (s) – Finish

Course T:* Start – TP – TUM – CW – TP – TUM – Finish (all s’board) [2 laps]

Course U:* Start – TUM – TP – CW – TUM – TP – Finish (all port) [2 laps]

* If Pennant 1 is displayed below Course flag T or U - one (1) lap only.

* If Pennant 3 is displayed below Course flag T or U - three (3) laps.

10.4 Transit Courses

Courses for Transit races will be posted on the Club Notice Board on race day.

10.5 Ocean Races

Courses for Ocean races will be posted on the Club Notice Board on race day.

10.6 Starting Line

The starting line for Committee Vessel starts shall be between the aft side of the signal gantry and a laid orange or yellow inflatable buoy or yellow RMS Yacht Mark. The starting line for Kogarah Bay starts will be between the Committee Vessel or BBYC club flagpole and CW. See 12.3 for Alternate Starting Methods.

10.7 Finish Line

- 10.7.1 The finishing line for Committee Vessel finishes on Botany Bay will be between CV and a laid orange or yellow inflatable buoy or yellow RMS Yacht Mark.
- 10.7.2 The finishing line on Kogarah Bay will be between CV and CW. If the Committee Vessel is not used, the finishing line will be between:
 - i. the BBYC mast and CW or, if CW is not laid
 - ii. the NE corner of Kogarah Bay Sailing Club and the BBYC mast.
- 10.7.3 The finishing line for Ocean Races will be between the Outer Towra red and green channel piles.

10.8 Alternate Start and Finish Lines and Courses

- 10.8.1 The Race Committee may, at its discretion, decide to use alternate courses, starting and/or finish lines.
- 10.8.2 Details of these courses, start and/or finish lines will be displayed on the Club notice board and/or communicated to participants by VHF Channel 77 prior to the scheduled Warning Signal.

11. Finish Times and Declarations

- 11.1 In all races where the finish line is not manned, including for all Twilight, Transit, Ocean and Night Races, a yacht's finish time (actual time, hh:mm:ss) must be declared to the Honorary Race Secretary or Fleet Captain in writing or by SMS/SIGNAL group app.
- 11.2 The smartphone app RaceQs must be activated, from BEFORE each yacht's starting signal until AFTER finishing, on all yachts competing in races where the finish line is not manned.
- 11.3 Time declarations must be lodged with the Honorary Race Secretary or Fleet Captain within two hours of the yacht's finish time.
- 11.4 The Honorary Race Secretary or Fleet Captain reserves the right to use Race Qs to determine the yacht's finish time.
- 11.5 A Declaration must also be lodged in any of the following circumstances:
 - 11.6 After rendering assistance;
 - 11.7 Any use of the motor;

11.8 Temporary discontinuance from racing; or

11.9 Not sailing the course due to a mark being missed or unsighted.

Use of the motor by a yacht that runs aground during a race is permitted, provided that the boat does not gain a significant advantage as a result.

12. Race Starts

12.1 Starting Sequence

12.1.1 Twilight race starts will use the countdown function of the electronic display board. The race will start when the display shows 00.

12.1.2 Races will be started in accordance with RRS 26.

12.1.3 Warning Signal—All races, all Yachts —“Orange” Flag

12.1.4 A sound signal may be made to accompany the raising or lowering of a flag.

12.1.5 Yachts whose warning signal has not been made shall keep clear of the start line.

12.1.6 Yachts may be designated as DNS if they arrive at the starting area later than 10 minutes after their actual start time.

12.2 Scheduled Start Times

12.2.1 Unless otherwise specified:

All Spring, Summer and Autumn Series races are scheduled to start at the times specified in the Schedule of Events.

12.2.2 All Winter Series races are scheduled to start at 13:00.

12.2.3 Unless otherwise specified, Twilight races will commence at 18:00.

12.2.4 Transit races limited to Kogarah and Botany Bays will be scheduled for Handicap starts with limit boat/s starting at 13:05.

12.2.5 Ocean races will commence at times posted in their Sailing Instructions.

12.3 Alternate Starting Methods

12.3.1 Time Allowed at Start (Pursuit; Handicap Start)

An electronic display board may be used to count up (in minutes) to a yacht’s starting time. Display of a yacht’s allocated starting time

(displayed as minutes after the race start) will be the starting signal for that yacht or group of yachts.

12.3.2 Gate Start

A notice will be posted on the club notice board to the effect that a “Gate Start” will be used. Such notice will nominate a particular yacht as the ‘Pathfinder’. A Starting Mark may or may not be used.

Start signals will be displayed on the stern of the Pathfinder and notice may be drawn by a sound signal or VHF radio announcement (Ch 77).

Preparatory Signal	Code flag ‘P’	4 minutes before start
Start Signal	White Flag	Start

Only one flag will be displayed at a time.

Raising of the White Flag is the Start signal.

At the Start signal, the Pathfinder will be racing, hard on a wind on **port tack**. All yachts will then start through the gate which will open behind the stern of the Pathfinder. A competing yacht may not cross the stern of the Pathfinder to commence racing before the Start signal has been made.

The Pathfinder will proceed for at least 100 metres displaying the White Flag, after which time the Pathfinder will drop the flag and assume a proper course to the first mark.

At this point, any yachts that have not yet crossed the stern of the Pathfinder must start to leeward and astern of the Pathfinder.



12.3.3 Alternate Starting Method

The Race Committee or Race Officer may start a race at their discretion using an alternate method, which will be communicated to participants before the Preparatory Signal.

13. Penalty System

13.1 A boat may take a ONE (1) turn penalty when she may have broken one or more rules of RRS Part 2 (“When boats meet”) in an incident while racing. This changes RRS 44.

14. Recalls

14.1 Individual recalls shall be in accordance with RRS 29.1. As an aid to competitors, the Race Committee may attempt to hail the recalled yacht(s) by sail number or boat name verbally or by VHF radio (Channel 77).

14.2 General recalls shall be in accordance with RRS 29.2

The start of the subsequent division(s) will follow the start of the recalled division by 5 minutes. In the event of a general recall, the order in which divisions will start will not be altered.

15. Postponement and Abandonment

15.1 The Race Committee will abandon a race if a Gale Warning or stronger is current for the race area within 2 hours of the scheduled starting time (refer to the BBYC Weather Warning Safe Sailing Policy, page 23).

15.2 The Race Committee may abandon a race if a Strong Wind Warning is current for the race area within 2 hours of the scheduled starting time.

15.3 The Race Committee or Race Officer may, at their discretion, postpone or abandon a race due to other hazards impacting participants (refer to the BBYC Weather Warning Safe Sailing Policy, p23, and BBYC Heat Stress Risk Policy, p26).

15.4 The Race Committee or Race Officer may, at their discretion, postpone or abandon a race for non-hazardous considerations, including before the start for light or no wind. As a guide, if it is considered unlikely that any yacht will complete two legs of a shortened course within the race time limit, the Race Officer may elect to abandon the race.



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- 15.5 Abandonment shall be signalled in accordance with RRS 32. Postponement will be signalled in accordance with RRS Race Signals (described on p67 of these Sailing Instructions).

16. Time Limit

16.1 Ocean Races

There is no time limit for Ocean races.

16.2 Twilight Races

Boats failing to finish within 15 minutes after sunset will be scored DNF. If more than one half of the fleet is initially scored DNF and the full course has been sailed, then the race will be considered to have been shortened at the first rounding of CW.

16.3 Bay Series Races

No race shall count unless the course is completed by the first yacht within 2 hours of its starting signal. Yachts failing to finish within 45 minutes after the first yacht sails the course and finishes shall be scored Did Not Finish. This changes RRS 35, A4 and A5.

16.4 All Sprint Series Races

No race shall count unless the course is completed by the first yacht within 1 hour of its starting signal. Yachts failing to finish within 20 minutes after the first yacht sails the course and finishes shall be scored Did Not Finish. This changes RRS 35, A4 and A5.

16.5 All Transit Series Races (does not apply to Ocean Races)

No race shall count unless the course is completed by the first yacht within 3 hours of its starting signal. Yachts failing to finish within 45 minutes after the first yacht sails the course and finishes shall be scored Did Not Finish. This changes RRS 35, A4 and A5.

17. Change of Course

- 17.1 Changes to the course will be made in accordance with RRS 33.

18. Shortening a Course

18.1 The Race Committee may shorten the course at any rounding mark or virtual line in accordance with RRS 32. The Race Officer has similar discretion where races are already in progress. This changes RRS 32.

19. Protests

19.1 Protests are to be lodged in accordance with RRS Part 5.

19.2 Protest forms are available from the clubhouse or a copy may be downloaded from the BBYC website.

19.3 A lodgement fee will be charged. A Fee may be fully refundable at the sole discretion of the Protest Committee.

20. Radio Communication

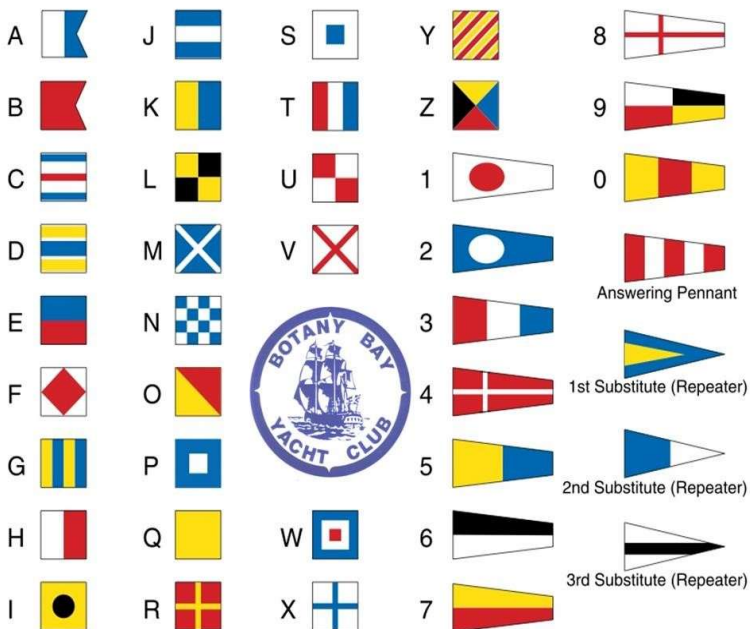
20.1 The Committee Vessel will monitor VHF Channels 16 and 77.

The Committee Vessel will endeavour to communicate any significant and relevant information, and changes relevant to racing, on VHF Channel 77.
